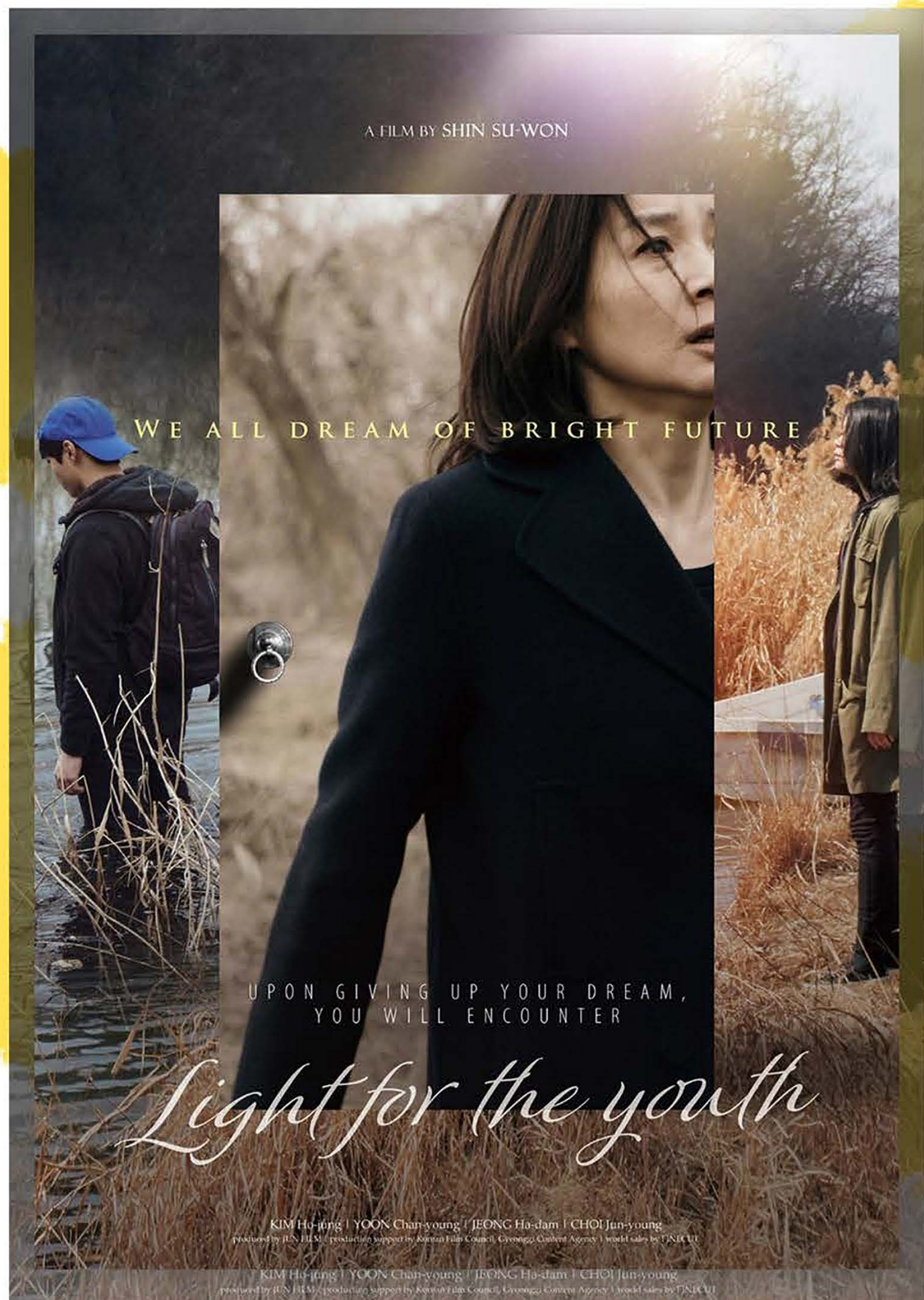


LIGHT FOR THE YOUTH (2019)

Shin Su-won is a film director and screenwriter. Shin wrote and directed *Passerby #3* (2010), *Circle Line* (2012), *Pluto* (2013), *Madonna* (2015), *Glass Garden* (2017), *Light for the Youth* (2019) and most recently *Hommage* (2022). Shin is renowned for innovative cinematography, astonishingly creative narrative structure, and social messages. Her films were invited and awarded in many prestigious international film festivals. In 2015, *Madonna* was invited to screen in the Un Certain Regard section of the 68 Cannes Film Festival.
